

What does it mean to be a Ranger?

It is a simple but moving ceremony, held annually around the world on the 31st July. Rangers from all units stand together in silence as the roll call of those who have died in action worldwide in the preceding 12 months is read out. The list may not be complete: some countries do not submit: some names might be omitted in error. The silence and respect is for all Rangers: a moment when we all understand that wherever we work and whatever our mandate, we are all part of one 'thin green line', defending our wildlife and the environment.

Of course it is in the field that the real work takes place.

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What it is to be a ranger continued:

Hours on patrol or in ambush, watching, waiting and all the time developing your understanding of the areas you work in. The better you know an area the more effectively you patrol it. Naturally you know your water points – not just the main ones but those obscure hidden springs and temporary pans inaccessible by road. You learn terrain and the plant types or prey preferred by any given species in an area. You know your herd structures and aim to understand them closely enough



you know your herd structures ad aim to understand them closely enough to detect the slightest change in their dynamics or behavior.

Then there are the tracks signs of course – not just the wildlife but the poachers themselves. The obvious is easy. It is the hidden that is most significant. So it is also a matter of knowing your enemy, understanding his signature way of working and attempting to out manoeuvre him; a task that requires endless patience and endurance.

At times the task seems impossible. It certainly is monumental and never-ending. Your failures are harrowing – because you will fail. It is impossible not to. The tortured deaths in a snare, the horrific injuries, the suffering inflicted by the snare you missed, the wounded animal you could not locate or the poacher you could not catch. These can bring total despair. But you carry on because every patrol, every ambush, makes the poachers life more difficult. Every snare you remove is an animal's life saved, and if you can save the life of one animal it is a step towards their survival.

So there they are – this thin green line, these unsung heroes. Not on parade but blending quietly into the landscape they know so well, concealed in stillness: unnoticed but dedicated and vigilant. A group of people I am proud to work with. For me this is the most rewarding work I have ever done. And as every day I patrol this diverse and beautiful country, I know that this is where I am meant to be.

Association Name Change Proposal

by now all Members should have received communication by Email or WhatsApp or perhaps both in regards to the Association name change proposal.

So why change name - Overall the reasons are two fold:

- 1. We believe it is time to modernise and emphasise a hunters role in conservation and sustainability. We feel the title "Professional Hunter" is outdated and sends an image of hunters of a bygone era. We believe it may be time to modernise and portray our hunters as ethical professionals whose focus is on customer service and long-term sustainable conservation.
- 2. As an Association we need to attract and represent non-consumptive guides. With an all-encompassing portfolio of Guides we gain strength to better support everyone in the tourism sector, including adding more weight to our ability to support hunting as a long term sustainable conservation model.

Going into more detail the name change is proposed due to the following reasons:

- Removes the word "Hunter" from the name without losing sight of the importance of hunting and the conservation element there of
- A necessary step towards keeping up with the times and modernising our image
- Emphasises the point that we are all "Guides" with a focus on providing our clients with
 the best service, but with different qualifications and roles. i.e. a "Guide" leading a client
 on a hunt, a "Guide" taking a canoeing safari, or a "Guide" leading a game drive, walking
 or horse safari etc.
- Increases the Associations ability to attract a higher membership that is more representative of entire tourism sector in Zimbabwe
- Will allow for more Zimbabwean photographic Operators to show the Association logo on their web pages and therefore gain better support for the Association
- Will allow for us to get better and more external funding as it will enhance the Associations reputation
- Will lend itself to members being more accepting of the mandatory registration of an accredited Association as a result of the E.C.C. coming into force
- The Association needs to be seen as "progressive thinking" and moving with the times A larger, stronger and more representative Association gives us more credibility to defend members and market a united conservation model that includes sustainable hunting as a crucial element of Zimbabwe's conservation requirements

- Trip 1 managed to collect 118 km of wire, it set the record and is a tough record to beat. Out of interest that is roughly 4 tonnes of wire..
- Trip 2 managed to collect 85 km of wire
- Trip 3 managed to collect 98 km of wire

IN CONJUNCTION WITH AUTOWORLD ZIMBABWE



It has become clear during this COVID year that, there are many battles in the field, Members fighting hard to protect their properties against the onslaught of poaching. To this regard, G.A.P. will provide back up Members in need. The program will go something like this...

- Members may apply for Assistance in conjunction with their own Antipoaching teams, meaning GAP will provide support to existing Anti-poaching programs but will not be there to set up new Anti-poaching program




