Recently Africa Addict had the huge privilege of exploring the diverse and magnificent parks belonging to our neighbour – Botswana. A two-week itinerary with great company at some of the most iconic camps the country has to offer.

I bonded immediately with my travelling companions and the banter was constant, the laughter endless and contagious and the love for our work – very mutual. All this accompanied with great guides, good wine, gastronomic feasts, and unforgettable shared adventures.

However – I realized very early in the trip it was going to be bit of a challenge for me when the game drive vehicle was made to stop for 45 minutes for what I thought was a large butterfly – it was actually a Sh*%&ing Pepsi-Cola! It dawned on me that for the next two weeks I was going to have a crash Courser on everything that had feathers. I braced myself. The first thing I learnt is that Burchell was a really cool guy back in the day. It was not all about Zebras!

Now I have done some birding and I thought I was quite good – it turns out that I am really Ruff. An Eastern Clapper Slapper from Townsend School whose poor identification skills had the other Doves Laughing. My birding needed some work! So, I decided to throw myself into this learning experience with gusto and ignore the sarcastic and humorous Snipes of my companions.

In all honesty, I was with the most patient, incredibly informed teachers. Their knowledge left me Open Billed as they Spoonbill fed me everything they knew. Additionally, our guides were such sharp-eyed Bustards – their spotting could be likened to a Martial art, so I knew that this was going to be my "Big Year!" (that's a birding term by the way!)

Big year - A big year is a personal quest among birders to identify as many species as possible, in a given amount of time, within a specific geographic area. It is the supreme birding experience, the stuff of birding legend and a thing of dreams and nightmares, optimism, and despair.

Despair. I tried not to think too much of that word – it would certainly upset my Tshagra, and I didn't want to be a cry baby Bunting. Then I really would look like a Knob Bill.

Early morning sunrise and late afternoon game drives showcased a plethora of fantastic feathers.

Together with 4 legged furry sightings – Botswana is a feast for the eyes. The "binos" were scanning left and right at whiplash rate, and the apps on the gadgets were "ticking" overtime. The Chat was all about birds. Juvies, sub adults, the irritating LBJ's and the difficult BOPS, the nest, the beak colour, the colour of the legs, the flight pattern – all the information left me a Red faced and Red Eyed. There was certainly very little input from this Tit. The only break we had from the birding bonanza was when we stopped for a Lifer saver G&T and a quick Darter to Squacco behind a bush.

There was one challenge I just could not conquer. Crowned, Crested, and Helmeted. Surely, they ALL mean the same thing. Whydah on Earth do we have to Waxbill lyrical as to exactly what is on the bird's head? My confusion with the style of bird hats had my newfound friends Roller-ing around laughing – they thought the whole thing was a Lark.

It was a lot to take in, but I absolutely loved it. I learned more in those two weeks than I did for my whole O level Syllabus. I learned to listen and repeat. "Allelo Mimetic." Much like Babblers and Green Wood Hoopoes – I resolved to just repeat, mimic, copy and paste everything that my colleagues said. These not so drab Females certainly knew their stuff. I will forever be indebted to them, and I thank them for their kindness and patience. Their incredible knowledge thankfully took the attention off their Thick Knees and Slaty complexions.

I have since become fanatical about birding. There is a pair of Bino's on my verandah and I will literally stop traffic, nearly causing an accident to Crane my neck dangerously out the window to ID a feathered friend. Most times it's just a Dove.....!

TIDES OF CHANGE THROUGH EDUCATION By John Laing

For a long time the photographic sector has not spoken outwardly of the Z.P.G.A. Was this because of the perception of a "boys club", or perhaps the fact that the Association supports "hunters", or one of many other incorrect perceptions?

It appears there is a buzz of excitement, I talk of an excitement from within the Association when I say, "Of course there is", I dare say all our members feel the energy of growth and the internal commitment to conservation, as well as the sense of belonging, but how has this been perceived from outside?

Well, the first indication has been watching the membership numbers grow. This I attribute to the positive attitude of members that talk to non-members whom have been convinced to join up and see this for themselves, the glossy monthly newsletter and the membership benefits shared and applied. The second indication has been the photographic operators that have made it compulsory for all their guides to join the Z.P.G.A.

I am not sure if I can say I was lucky enough or not, but on Wednesday the 12th of January I was definitely privileged to be invited to the African Bush Camps Travel Agent evening. Thirty-six agents from Zimbabwe were invited to Harare as a "thank you" from African Bush Camps for all the support the Travel Agents had given ABC, especially during the last two years. I was supposed to talk for fifteen minutes but I am sure it ended up more like forty-five!

So, I discussed a couple of our conservation initiatives currently underway, our MOU with Birdlife Zimbabwe, our pending MOU with African Been Products, the "Tree planting" initiative, our siding with "Victoria Falls Pristine Society", our "Birding Routes" program, to name but a handful. Without doubt what the Z.P.G.A. is doing is incredible, and whilst imperative to all of us, this was not the main focus of what the Travel Agents were particularly interested in hearing about in depth.

Travel Agents, in a simplified way are there to sell the camps, but a camp is no good to man or beast without staff. So the focus of the evening centered around better understanding where the Z.P.G.A. is in terms of guides and guide education.

The Z.P.G.A.'s relationship with Parks is vital to the industry, as no licenses are issued unless there is a Z.P.G.A. and National Parks signature on each one. So quite literally you are guaranteed to see the Z.P.G.A. at the Learner exams, at the shooting test, at the Oral Exams and at the Proficiency exams. As of last year, 2021, all the examiners have an "examiners" shirt, this has never happened before. The shirts are cobranded with both the National Parks and Z.P.G.A. emblems - a partnership to be applauded.





Over and above the apprentice-based training system in Zimbabwe, it would seem a bit strange if the Z.P.G.A. just pitched up to the Examinations and did not provide support in the form of training to our up-and-coming candidates. We can break our involvement into several categories:

- We have just launched a newly revised study pack aimed at persons attempting their Learner exams. Post the exams these study packs can, and should be, used as an ongoing reference for the Learners. Important items such as the law are included in these packs and as such will probably be referred to often. We have identified "tutors" from around the country that provide training to candidates and work with them ensuring the training content is correct and current, all these persons are members, meaning they are always kept abreast of industry trends.
- We have partnered with ACE Air & Ambulance. All persons holding a license in Zimbabwe, by law must have a first aid certificate. Members get a special discounted rate when booking their training through the Association which does not compromise on the standard or quality of the training.
- We have set up shooting fun days in Harare and anticipate these to expand into Bulawayo and Victoria Falls where, not only do we train the up-and-coming learners, but we now regularly practice with the Professional License holders too.

- By far our most exciting initiative is the Learners course that we will be holding in February of this year (the 12th to the 19th) at the Bubye Valley Conservancy. Aimed at persons that are going to the February Learner exams, intermediates that want to go to their Proficiency exams in a couple years' time and those that wish to attend this year in November. This year we have 44 candidates and a waiting list. In order to train these candidates, we have 20 professionals giving of their time, investing in the future of guiding in Zimbabwe, improving the standards throughout and ensuring a better pass rate at the intended exams.
- If that is not enough, Dave Carson has also set up a WhatsApp training platform, free to any Learner, where daily there is a different topic discussed. A few examples of topics discussed: fossils, birds, parasitism, the three chambered heart of a crocodile, camouflage. The list is quite literally non exhaustive and what's more is the Professional license holders on that group are learning just as much.
- Lastly, we have set up a train-the-trainer program where-by we analyse all candidates that go through Proficiency. As a co-examiner we now hold a yearly workshop with all interested Professionals and explain to them what went wrong, where tutors need to improve, or work more on in terms of their apprentices.

Delivering a speech at a formal function is quite daunting, one never knows who is going to be in the audience and how they will react to what you have to say. Preparation is key of course, but there is always an element of doubt.

I can say from the "front of the class" that the interest and amazement at what and where the Z.P.G.A. is, was very apparent. Thirty-six Travel agents were in attendance, and I was asked for thirty-six business cards. Already I am receiving email applications to join the Association as Associate Members.

I have titled my write up as "Tides Of Change Through Education" and I now know that it is imperative to educate people as to what it is that we as an Association stand for. Whatever your views are, there is no doubt that the Z.P.G.A. is impressive and is a driving force in Conservation.

Onwards and upwards, our next education platform is African Eden, hosted in Victoria Falls at the beginning of February. From there our Association's goal is to be present at Durban's Ndaba, and why not, the Z.P.G.A. is something to talk about. Our relationships all over Zimbabwe are growing all the time as we tackle the many issues we face in this sector. The Z.P.G.A. is determined to succeed, and I ask everyone, not only to look up our social media pages, but to understand what we stand for and to get behind us as we get behind the industry.

My thanks go to Allan van Rensburg whom invited me to this event and made it all possible. To Bryan Martin and Karl Parkinson of ABC thank you for putting on the event and not forgetting Armadale Guest Lodge, in particular Nikki Blythewood, for all your hard work in hosting what was a great evening.

Roast Chicken on a Weber

Ingredients

- 1 Whole chicken, 1.8 kg to 2.0 kg
- Oil
- Sea salt
- Freshly ground black pepper

Directions

- Prepare your Weber or drum for indirect cooking over medium heat (190°C to 230°C) and remember if you are using a Weber, set it up your with a convection tray. This is where all the fats and oils will be collected and which you may wish to make gravy with later
- Tuck the wings behind the chicken's back. Lightly coat the chicken with olive oil and season all over with salt and pepper
- Roast the chicken over indirect medium heat for 1 hour and 15 minutes, with the lid closed, or until the internal temperature has reached 71°C-ensuring the tip of the probe is in the deep centre of the chicken breast, but not touching the cavity. The internal temperature will continue to rise 3°C to 6°C while resting (final doneness temperature for chicken is 74°C)
- Once the chicken has cooked, leave to rest for 15 minutes before carving



Ranger Training January 2022

It has long been discussed, with the general consensus being, we need to somehow support our National Parks Rangers. What better way to do this than to provide a week long training course to National Parks Rangers whom carry a L.P.G. License and who work with tourists on game drives and walks and an opportunity to provide an insight into what is expected from a visitors perspective.

The course, a brainchild of National Parks Chief Examiner, Mr. Isaac Nyamutora, and Deputy Chief examiner, Mr. Power Mupunga and Chief Examiner Z.P.G.A., Mr. David Carson. This trio already meant that Zimbabwe Parks would team up with the Zimbabwe Professional Guides Association to make and drive this initiative, but this would not have happened without the support and sponsorship of Keith Vincent and Wilderness Safaris as well as Paige Gehren and the Isibindi Foundation.

Through this generosity we were able to give twelve National Parks Rangers a weeklong training program, exposing the participants to the various core aspects of what it means to be a Guide.

The course, led by David Carson and Charles Ndlovu aimed at providing the candidates with a solid foundation for their future within the guided world.

Topics covered were:

- Etiquette and all aspects of hosting guests was delivered by Chooks Langerman and included, back of house, laying tables, how to serve wine, water and even food. How to lay out a tea table, a sundowner and how to make it experiential for the guests
- We dedicated an afternoon to lecturing on "laying out a safety briefing" and then practiced on delivering the safety talk ensuring the main points were covered
- All aspects of taking a game drive from how to introduce oneself, safe speeds, how to talk to guests from
 the front of the vehicle while explaining something, where to stop so guests can all see and if people are
 taking pictures, what is the best angles. All Rangers had turns leading the drives and so we could
 practice these skills on the ground
- We also worked on how to identify birds by working out the general description which narrows it down to the family, which in turn lead to the name. This we practiced the whole week and all rangers picked up these skills very fast
- On the walking safaris we did approaches on elephants as well as conducting some nature rambles. We also practiced group control, hand signals and communicating on a walk with guests
- Jane Hunt of Wildcru came in and gave us a talk on lions in general and especially the lions of Hwange National Park. We were very fortunate to go with her while she darted a male lion at Ngamo and fitted a tracking collar

- Gary Cantle of Friends of Hwange helped us with the shooting practice. This was possibly the highlight of the course and was a great success with ample rounds having been funded for us. Overall the Rangers shot incredibly well
- We also took time to lecture on how to lay a logbook out and the documents that are required, as well as providing advice on better understanding each individual's road map to becoming a Professional

From my opinion the course was a resounding success. The feedback I have been given from the candidates echoes my sentiments. I put this down to the course giving the Rangers a view into guiding from the private sector and has helped to better understand what is expected of them especially when dealing with the general public on walks and drives.

It is our hope that this was the first of many joint collaborations. In fact, Wilderness Safaris through Keith Vincent, have committed to the next Ranger Training. We, as the Z.P.G.A. will do our best to try and help the Rangers that attended the course to have time in safari camp to interact with guests and gain more experience.


