

World Wildlife Conference to rule on stricter trade regulations for 600

Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species of Wild Fauna and Flora



This year's World Wildlife Conference is being asked to consider stricter trade for nearly six hundred species of animals and plants believed to be under increased threat of extinction from international trade. In what's being seen as a barometer for the state of the world's wildlife, just 9 species are being recommended for less restrictive trade regulations.

The proposals have been put forward by Parties to the Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species of Wild Fauna and Flora (CITES) to be reviewed at the 19th meeting of the Conference of the Parties (CoP19), which will take place in Panama from the 14th to the 25th of November. Before each CoP, the Parties - or countries that have agreed to be bound by CITES - put forward proposals to review or change the regulations that govern international trade in specific species, based on whether they believe that trade needs to be controlled to 'avoid utilization incompatible with their survival'.

The Parties to the Convention will send representatives to this year's meeting, which is being seen as make or break for some species. Proposals have been put forward to review the regulations on rhinos, elephants, rosewoods and other timber species, sharks, orchids, turtles and rhodiola or golden root. A total of 52 proposals will be up for decision, with countries already working together behind the scenes to bring the focus onto species of common interest. Forty-seven Parties have proposed or are co-proposing these proposals.

Biodiversity is one of the main indicators of the planet's health and the fact that so many species are thought to be at increased risk is a worrying trend. CITES has three Appendices, listing species according to the degree of protection they need in terms of regulation of international trade. Listing on Appendix I means that all international commercial trade in specimens of the species concerned is prohibited. Trade in species in Appendix II is regulated by a permitting system and needs evidence that the international trade is sustainable and not detrimental to the survival of the species in the wild. Parties can unilaterally ask for species to be listed on Appendix III, when they want to track their international trade and be able to monitor the effects on the species.

Each of the proposals will be considered at the CoP in November, and for those that are agreed, the changes to the regulation of international trade will come into force 90 days later.

There are 184 Parties to CITES (including the European Union) which means the Convention has near universal acceptance and authority over the international trade in those threatened species included in its Appendices. CITES overall goal is that trade in CITES-listed species should be legal, traceable and sustainable.

Nearly 4,000 government officials, experts, representatives of trade organizations, NGOs and local, national and international organizations that work on conservation, biodiversity and the environment are expected to attend the meeting in Panama in November. They will spend two weeks considering and debating, with the Parties making decisions on, the most pressing issues in wildlife trade and conservation.

CITES Secretary-General, Ivonne Higuero, welcomed the strong interest from the Parties, "Trade in wildlife products is enormously important. There is almost no area of our lives that is not dependent on nature and this is why the international trade in wild fauna and flora must be sustainable. Our survival depends upon it and the decisions that the CITES Parties will take in November will contribute to the conservation of species, of biodiversity and to the health of our planet."

Pride, passion and hut painting: Discovering art, tradition and self-expression in rural Matopos

We all have those stand-out experiences in life, those instances so poignant they make us pause and consider how we managed to live so long without this precise moment.

Mine was on a freakishly warm winter afternoon in Ward 24 of the Matobo Rural District, during a workshop on traditional hut painting. The sun was warm on my back, the children and gogos of the village were singing and dancing, soft clouds of dust rising at their feet, and I had a stick in one hand, an enamel cup with rich, wet soil in the other, and I was painting the warm, textured surface of a hut.

Ma Sibanda sketched the outline with the handle of an old toothbrush and, side by side, we painstakingly filled in the lines. Time and ages and geographic delineations and cultural barriers all fall away at a moment like that and suddenly all that matters is this place, this song, the stick in your hand and the feeling inside that you could quite happily do this forever.

I was born and brought up in Bulawayo, with Matopos practically my playground. Yet it took until my mid-40s to discover and explore the other side of this incredible area: the rural district, the parts of the Matopos bordering the Matobo National Park whose rolling granite landscapes are, literally, the backyard of thousands of families.

Interesting enough, it was the art and architecture which brought me here, as a founding committee member of the My Beautiful Home initiative. As far as "crews" go, ours could not have been more motley: a journalist, a scientist cum photographer, an architect, an archaeologist, a cultural expert, a lover of nature and the outdoors, all of us infatuated with this beautiful part of the world. We were drawn together with the idea of starting a competition to recognise and encourage the art form. That first year – 2014 – we had 30 entries. The following year, 300.

For many of us, the competition was only the start. Even more significant, and with a sense of urgency which grew the deeper we became involved, was trying to trace this traditional art form, understand its origins and symbolism and, most important of all, find a way to ensure it didn't die out, as so many beautiful cultural practices have.

The project captured not only the imagination but also the mandate of the US Ambassador's Fund for Cultural Preservation, and My Beautiful Home was awarded funds to research and document the art and architecture of the area, all of which are now recorded in a book, "Preservation of Ndebele Art and Architecture".

Sharing their lives and talents is a privilege I try never to take for granted. The women on either side of me as I paint are not strangers. For years, we've visited their homes, been warmly invited to sit around the fire in their kitchens, the firelight playing on the intricately moulded clay shelves which line the walls, enamel dishes winking in the warm glow; held their children; stroked the new-born chicks and the scrawny but much-loved puppies; tasted broth made from pumpkin seeds and fresh, young mealies; seen the women's pride, and that of their entire families, as they showcased that year's art work, standing shyly to the side to give us space, quietly trying to gauge our reaction. We've seen pregnant bellies one year transform into suckling babies the next, and as the years and seasons have unfolded, so has the art.

So on that warm winter day, we paint, my friends and I, side by side, and the gogos continue to sing. The song is a lament about the lazy ones, the ones who don't rise at dawn with the crowing of the cockerel, the ones who don't come to help with the chores but sleep right through them. The women at my side are clearly not that kind of woman.

They are extremely hard working, with water to fetch and fires to make, children and husbands and extended family to care for, food to find and cook, livestock to tend – and yet they still find time to gather, prepare and mix the natural pigments to delicately decorate their homes, year after year as the rains wash their canvases clean. A fresh start every year.



Self-expression is an important part of it, we learnt through the workshops, but not only in the actual practice of hut painting. The songs they sing as they paint is another form of expression. The laments, like that of the "lazy"; in Ma Sibanda's song, the grudges over neighbours, complaints about husbands, ill-behaved children, it all comes out in the songs.

"I grew up watching my mother painting our hut", says archaeologist and member of the My Beautiful Home team, Simon Makuvasa. She was a quiet women, she'd never say much about her inner feelings. But all you had to do to know her heart was to listen to her songs while she painted.

"The tradition of building and painting a homestead is much more complex than just shelter and aesthetics. You only had to listen to my mother to know that".

But of course the designs chosen for the walls are also a significant form of self-expression. Thokozile Dube, who has been a consistent winner of the competition, tells us she sees the designs for the walls of her hut like other people see the notes in music, sometimes in dreams; Uzile, a strong young woman who is fearlessly raising two children alone, uses the walls to tell her life's story: the larger-than-life drawing of a lion bearing down on a man is her father's story. He was mauled by a lion after running in to the bush to make amends with Uzile's mother after a marital tiff. He found the lion instead but survived, returning to the family scarred but in one piece. Her mother was never seen again.

These are the stories we tried to capture, each one a unique gem, each one worthy of recording so it can be retold, much like the oral traditions which inspire the art.

At the end of the workshop we give a ride to Thulisa Ndlovu, a competition winner who, together with husband, Joseph, and their three young children, painstakingly covered every hut in their neatly-swept compound with the most perfectly measured and executed interlocking jigsaw puzzle pieces.

Joseph is excited to see us and, with a finger to his lips, conspiratorially motions for us to follow him in to the hut at the far end, his and Thulisa's bedroom. We were in here last year, when the couple showed us the early design trials of the puzzle which they worked on each evening in the glowing embers of the dying fire. On the other wall is the design they've come up with, an intricate geometric creation which, through its incredibly clever delivery, has a 3-D effect.

Just then Thulisa runs in, mock panic on her face: "No cameras, we want it to be a surprise!" And she and Joseph look at each other and laugh. So we've deleted all evidence and wait, with bated breath, to see the images emerge from their incredible designer minds on to the walls of their hut, and we're quite sure we're once again going to be amazed.

We drive away in the soft golden light of the setting sun, the overriding hope being that the littlest Ndlovu who, last year, was in her older sister's arms but this year has learnt to toddle around on her own, is watching and learning, so one day she'll continue the family tradition and pass it on to her own children. A never-ending cycle of love and passion and art.


According to WWF (World Wildlife Fund), one of the greatest conservation success stories to happen is the recovery of the Southern White rhino. In the late 1800s, rhinos were considered extinct in Africa, largely due to hunting and habitat loss. It was later discovered that there was a small population of about 50 rhinos still clinging on in South Africa. The excitement of this discovery led to a flurry of activity and the creation of protected areas and the breeding of rhinos in private centres. Though poaching is still a problem, the population has swelled from just 50 to a staggering 11,000, making this the most numerous of all rhino sub-species. Wildlife surveillance has helped to keep poaching to a minimum.

The successes from South Africa were contagious. In the 1990s, the first ever rhino sanctuary was opened in Uganda, with just three rhinos to populate it. There are now upwards of 20 rhinos residing at the sanctuary, roaming freely around, procreating and re-establishing themselves. Although poaching is always a concern, the local population benefits from the sanctuary through eco-tourism and job creation, meaning that they are adamant to do all they can to protect their new neighbours. This conservation initiative is certainly an exciting one. Back here in Zimbabwe we have had Black rhino moved back into the Gonarezhou.

The last of the original Black rhino population in the area was killed sometime between the 1930s and 1940s. This is a vague timeline, but with 500 000 hectares of remote and rugged bush country a more exact estimate is not possible. A reintroduction project between 1969 and 1977 brought 77 black rhino back into the area. Their numbers grew to 140 before the civil war in neighbouring Mozambique resulted in Gonarezhou being closed to the public. The wave of rhino poaching sweeping through the continent in the early 1980's did not spare Gonarezhou, and by 1994 the black rhino population was tragically locally extinct for the second time.

The Gonarezhou Conservation Project was initiated in 2007 through a partnership agreement between the Zimbabwe Parks and Wildlife Management Authority and the Frankfurt Zoological Society. This project culminated in the formation of the Gonarezhou Conservation Trust, which was formally launched in March 2017. During this time considerable progress had been made to rectify the problems that led to the previous rhino extinction in the park. All existing rangers have gone through intense refresher courses and new rangers have been hired from surrounding communities after completing a rigorous selection course and training. The rangers have been supplied with the necessary equipment for them to be effective in their task of protecting the Park's wildlife and habitats. This has contributed to the reduction of poaching as well as an increase in motivation and ranger skills. Sustainable funding has also allowed the Project, and now the Trust, to not only have a positive impact on security in the Park, but on all aspects of general operations, inclusive of tourism.

All this work has led to the situation where a successful rhino reintroduction has been made possible.





Community Rhino Conservation Initiative (CRCI) is about reintroducing rhino to the southern Hwange area, on communal land, to benefit the local people through employment, education, engagement and direct revenue.



RHINO CONSERVATION

In 1985, Hwange National Park had 100 white rhino; by the 1990s, poaching was rampant. In 2007, the last white rhino was seen and killed by foreign poachers near Ngamo in the southern part of the Park. The Community Rhino Conservation Initiative aims to re-introduce rhino to this part of Zimbabwe in a highly secure and sustainable way to eventually accommodate a viable population of free roaming black and white rhino.



COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

Communities that do not benefit from conservation often harbour negative attitudes towards wildlife. The Community Rhino Conservation Initiative places local communities at the heart of conservation efforts and engages them as rhino custodians for them to reap directly from the Initiative's benefits. These communities have allocated and entrusted some of their communal grazing land specifically for rhino conservation. Rhino viewing fees from tourists visiting our partner Invelo Safari Lodges will generate social and economic returns to go back into these communities.



INNOVATIVE SELF-SUSTAINING MODEL

The reintroduction of rhino will catalyse and grow socio-economic benefits exponentially in the local communities. This model of community-based conservation will simultaneously generate funds for community development and sustain, finance and expand conservation efforts.










THE COBRAS COMMUNITY WILDLIFE PROTECTION UNIT

The Cobras Community Wildlife Protection Unit are a group of scouts, all of whom are from the local villages. They have been trained in first aid, conservation education, communications, weapons handling, conservation law and rhino monitoring to be able to best support and protect the area's wildlife as well as alleviate human-wildlife tensions.

They carry out important activities including rhino protection, patrolling for snares, wildlife management, firefighting, environmental education and human-wildlife conflict resolution. Our Cobras have been selected amongst many; their training is arduous and they have developed mental and physical competencies that make them respected across the area and able to inspire younger generations to become guardians of wildlife.





RHINO BACK IN HWANGE

In the south-eastern part of the country, the Malilangwe team carefully identified rhinos no.803 and no.204 to be the first rhino back to the area. Soon after, their professional team, supported by Parks and Wildlife Management Authority and experienced vets from the Victoria Falls Wildlife Trust, swung into action to capture and boma them. After being closely monitored for a couple of weeks, the rhino were ready to be translocated: 750km of tar roads, dirt roads, thick kalahari sands and just a few potholes ahead of them. The rhinos were transported in two separate crates on an impressive 6-wheel truck, and accompanied by an important convoy of scouts, vets and experts. The trip lasted over 14 hours, with several stops on the way to check upon the rhinos' conditions. They crossed towns and villages, passing by waving school children and interested community members. Finally, they arrived at CRCI's first sanctuary, the Imvelo Ngamo Wildlife Sanctuary where they were welcomed by our Cobras Community Protection scouts as well as a group of community leaders. For 5 weeks, the rhino were kept in an internal boma, until they were released into the wider sanctuary, where they are guarded 24/7 by Cobras Community Wildlife Protection Scouts.



Aside from employment and direct revenue from tourism through rhino viewing fees, local communities have been at the heart of designing and developing CRCI. Educating school children, as well as community members, has, and continues to be, essential to the long-term success of the Initiative. This allows people to get to know their new neighbours, understand CRCI and its conservation and community development opportunities, and see and experience its benefits.













AND NOW?

CRCI is currently working establishing another sanctuary further along Hwange's southern boundary, as part of its Phase 2.





IT'S ALL ABOUT THE BLOOD

The Salisbury Districts Blood Transfusion Service was established in 1958 as a not-for-profit making company. The Bulawayo Districts Blood Transfusion Service was later established in 1960. In order to ensure conformity of practice and to provide a cost-effective national service, it was agreed to form a single transfusion service - The National Blood Transfusion Service (NBTS) and in 2005 the organization was renamed from National Blood Transfusion Service to National Blood Service Zimbabwe.

In executing its mandate, NBSZ seeks to improve the quality of life of patients in need of blood without any form of discrimination. NBSZ's services cover the whole country and this is done through five regional offices - Mutare (for Manicaland Region), Harare (for the three Mashonaland Provinces), Gweru (for Midlands Region), Masvingo (Masvingo Province) and Bulawayo for (Matebeleland North, & South and the Bulawayo Metropolitan provinces). NBSZ has strategically positioned itself in order to respond effectively and efficiently to people's needs.

WHY SHOULD I DONATE BLOOD?

Giving blood is a pure and selfless act from one person, who voluntarily donates their blood for another unknown person, without pressure or expectation of any form of reward or payment in cash or kind.

WHO CAN DONATE BLOOD?

Between the ages of 16-60 years old Weigh more than 50kg Be in good health Lead a safe, low risk lifestyle

WHY IS THERE A FEE TO BUY BLOOD?

The fee is for the costs incurred in the collection, purchase price of blood bags; reagents for blood group and Rh typing; screening for infectious agents; preparation of blood components; storage and blood cold chain; utility, administrative costs, transport and staff costs; maintenance and quality systems among many other costs, which are essential to ensure safety, access and availability of blood to every hospital nationally; At each Hospital the blood banks have fees, which they charge for testing the patient's blood group and Rhesus type, matching the blood unit to the patient, to ensure compatibility and safety and various other tests necessary. These fees are quite separate from the Blood Unit Fee required by NBSZ to recover expenses for producing a safe unit of blood.


