The Tuli Circle: an unusual border feature between Zimbabwe and Botswana

Described as "a settlement without a society [offering] only heat, fever, snakes and whisky," Fort Tuli was established as "the gateway to Rhodesia" in early July 1890 (Shinn 1974). It was mistakenly named Fort Tuli owing to the belief that it was located on the Tuli River, which in fact was some 15 miles upstream (McLaughlin 1982: xiv), and the Pioneers were instead camped on the banks of the Shashi River. As "the gateway to Rhodesia," Tuli was merely the latest in a long line of entry points to the country north of the Limpopo that also included Mangwe, the Save-Lundi Rivers, and the Hunter's Road. The name simply means "dust".

A thriving settlement developed in the area around Fort Tuli, especially once the safety of potential settlers and visitors from Ndebele attacks was all but guaranteed (de la Harpe 2004). From 1890 to 1893 it was the main point of entry for almost all Europeans wishing to enter the country as part of the colonial takeover of Mashonaland. It had hotels, a rough hospital, police depot complete with prison, a printing press and local newspaper — named the Tuli Times — whose first edition appeared on 16 July 1891. Several permanent residents catered to the needs of travellers (Shinn 1974) including a barber, restaurant, bakery, a soda water manufactory and several forwarding agents dealing with the smooth flow of goods to the north. The telegraph line passed through Tuli on its way to Fort Victoria on 28 May 1891 and reached Masvingo on 16 February 1892. Several thousand people passed through the settlement in its first five years as well as thousands of horses, donkeys and cattle used for transport.


The settlement became increasingly irrelevant, especially after the conquest of Matabeleland in late 1893. Via Palapye, the road to Bulawayo was opened and from there the way to Harare and the rest of the country lay wide open.

Tuli would be briefly revived in the Second South African War in 1899 as a base for Colonel Plumer's force (Burrett 2009). There were 750 men stationed here for a time, 220 of which were members of the BSAP who had taken part in the 1895/1896 Jameson Raid that arguably hastened the start of the entire war.

By 1904 Tuli was a mostly abandoned settlement. There were a handful of the BSAP who patrolled the border, and only two stores remained at this time. The old telegraph line became the only contact with the outside world for weeks at a time, messages, if there were any, being received once a day. The Police Station was closed in 1939 and only reestablished in 1956 with two men.

The perfect half-circle around Tuli originated in 1891, created when the first magistrate arrived, from a concession of land granted by Chief Khama to the BSACo (Shinn 1974). The company wanted to use the land as a cordon sanitaire against indigenous cattle that might be infected with disease; unsurprisingly, Khama was of the same mind but with a view to the animals belonging to the whites! The biggest fear was of lung disease (Shinn 1974: 21).

The concession consisted of a piece of land south of the Shashi river and within a 10-mile radius of the fort on the south bank of the river at Tuli. It was thus proclaimed on 27 June 1891, giving the resident magistrate jurisdiction over an area within a radius of 10 miles from Tuli, between the Shashi and Lundi Rivers. The original resident magistrate was Pieter Raaff, who went on to create a 225-man force known as Raaff's Rangers in the 1893 Anglo-Ndebele War, before co-leading the Shangani Patrol. He is buried in Bulawayo.



According to legend the radius for this distance was agreed upon using the average distance of a day's wagon trek in this rugged area. Such distance can be calculated from looking at the route and distance covered by the Pioneer Column (Darter 1914; Johnson 1940; McLaughlin 1982). Alternatively it is reported that the radius was decided as the range of a cannon fired from the fort's battlements (de la Harpe 2004). This is unlikely because the Pioneer Column was only armed with two 7-pounder muzzle loading 200lb. pieces, also known as RML 7-pounder Mountain Guns and two 24 pounder Hale rocket tubes on stands (Tylden 1968; Hall 1979; Cross 2016). The maximum range for the Mountain Guns was only 2,700 metres while the rockets could reach only 3.5 kilometres at best (Tylden 1968; Hall 1979; Cross 2016). During the Second Anglo-Boer War (1899-1902), larger calibre field guns were used that had greater range (Burrett 2009), but would still not have shot the full ten miles while the informal boundary was well-fixed by the time by Article 4 of the Southern Rhodesia Order in Council dated 20 October 1898. The siting and construction of boundary beacons was not done until 1954.

Tuli, now spelled Thuli, Safari Area was proclaimed in 1975. Prior to that — from 1958 — it was a controlled hunting area. There are three very small botanical reserves in the wider Safari Area, namely Tolo River (0,44 km2), Pioneer (0,38 km2) and South Camp (0,26 km2). The area today is regarded as an integral part of Zimbabwe's contribution to the Greater Mapungubwe Transfrontier Conservation Area (formerly known as the Limpopo–Shashe Transfrontier Conservation Area), together with Sentinel Ranch and Nottingham Estate. A gem of an area, its main interest to many visitors to Zimbabwe lies in its unusual border. One hopes that, one day soon, its incredible natural beauty, fascinating archaeology and history and marvellous flora and fauna will be more easily accessible and more widely enjoyed as the Transfrontier Park becomes a reality.

A Hunters Perspective By Amin Turk

Zimbabwe is a landlocked country in southern Africa. A land of vast beauty and incredible landscapes, home to one of the seven wonders of the world; the mighty Victoria Falls. Surrounded by Zambia to the north (separated by the Zambezi River), Mozambique to the east, South Africa to the south and Botswana to the west. A land home to the Big 5 and various other wildlife species. A land rich in diversity of animals, habits and habitats and full of spectacular flora and fauna. A land that welcomes tourists with immense opportunities, and offers memorable experiences that will stay with you for a lifetime.

I am a licensed professional hunter and guide and a proud member of the Zimbabwe Professional Guides Association and I feel it is important to explain the ins and outs of hunter guiding in Zimbabwe and the various opportunities it has to offer. Most of Zimbabwe's hunting areas are made-up of government areas, Parks and Wildlife safari areas and rural communities. These are huge and vast blocks of land, hundreds and thousands of hectares in expanse that are unfit for human habitation or agricultural purposes because of low rainfall and harsh terrain, but are best suited and set aside as a haven for wildlife and animals that can survive these harsh conditions.

The Zimbabwe National Parks and Wildlife Authority are the custodians of all wildlife in the country. All species quotas throughout the country are set by the Department of Wildlife Authority and, reassuringly, quota setting is a very strict process with many stakeholders within the wildlife industry, both private and governmental. They all come together through workshops and deliberate before each animal species is given a quota for hunting. This strict quota setting process even engages top ecologists and scientific research teams to come up with a sustainable hunting management offtake quota system. If one does not read or understand the above merits one can never fathom the phrase hunting through conservation.



I am often asked how does hunting through conservation work. Well, let me try and explain. With the above understanding of how sustainable hunting quotas are set wildlife is given a monetary value. The value of our wildlife is now marketed through the hunting world by safari operators and marketing agents alike. Our hunting quotas generate revenue streams, and money generated therefrom are channeled through the respective local authorities.

The hunter's/client's dollars play a vital and pivotal role in both animal and area conservation. In reality, the small, sustainable hunting quotas provide revenue and income for the survival of all the animal species in their respective areas. It is the hunter's dollars that provide employment to pay game scouts to look after and police the hunting areas, and it is the hunter's dollars that provide funds to sink boreholes that provide water for humans, as well as domesticated livestock and wildlife in rural areas and communities. The same hunter's dollars pay for the building of schools to provide education in rural communities. Again the same hunter's dollars provide funding to build clinics in rural communities, which in turn provide healthcare.

In addition the hunter's dollars provide funding for the maintenance and surveying of roads that service the hunting areas and provide service of transportation into rural communities. The same roads that provide a mobile service for transportation of anti-poaching units for the very survival of all animal species. Furthermore most animal species that are harvested during the hunts are given to the local communities, who in turn distribute the meat to the rural communities to provide food for the people.

In conclusion, sustainable hunting can have numerous benefits for both the environment and local communities when hunting is managed responsibly. There is no question that hunting can help conserve wildlife populations, provide economic benefits, contribute food security, and promote a deeper connection with nature. As such it is important to promote and support sustainable hunting practices.



Beef Stroganoff

BY BETTY CROCKER

Ingredients

- 1½ pounds beef sirloin steak, 1/2 inch thick
- 8 ounces fresh mushrooms, sliced (2 1/2 cups)
- · 2 medium onions, thinly sliced
- 1 garlic clove, finely chopped
- ¼ cup butter
- 1 ½ cups beef flavoured broth
- ½ teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
- ¼ cup all-purpose flour
- 1 ½ cups sour cream
- · 3 cups cooked egg noodles



Method:

- Cut beef across grain into about 1 1/2 x 1/2-inch strips.
- Cook mushrooms, onions and garlic in butter in 10-inch skillet over medium heat, stirring occasionally, until onions are tender; remove from skillet.
- Cook beef in same skillet until brown. Stir in 1 cup of the broth, the salt and Worcestershire sauce. Heat to boiling; reduce heat. Cover and simmer 15 minutes.
- Stir remaining 1/2 cup broth into flour; stir into beef mixture. Add onion mixture; heat to boiling, stirring constantly. Boil and stir 1 minute. Stir in sour cream; heat until hot (do not boil). Serve over noodles.




